A Note from the Pastor

October puts us into the third quarter of the year – heading into the home stretch! After a quarter century of working for a publicly traded company, that's how my mind works. Although I know that many folks in the congregation are accustomed to thinking in terms of academic years, meaning we are approaching mid-term exams.

Regardless of our secular frame of reference, we are nearing the end of the liturgical year with only two months to go. The first Sunday in December will move us into Advent 1 – the first Sunday in Year B - the year of reading from the Gospel of Mark. The Worship Committee is already hard at work thinking about midweek Advent services and how they differ from midweek services during Lent. As decisions are made, more information will be shared about how we will mark the Advent season together in a thoughtful way to enhance our spiritual journey with our Lord, Jesus Christ.

Stepping back to where we are at present, the last four Sundays in October will feature guest singers to lead us through the final weeks of our liturgy composed by Tim Fink. There will also be a change in the opening of the liturgy to focus on a prayer attributed to St. Francis of Assisi, who is commemorated on October 4th as a "Renewer of Society."

October will be a month of settling into our new Sunday School and Adult Education classes and marking Reformation Day on October 29th. I encourage you to bring your children and grandchildren to Sunday School and to participate in a class yourself either on Sunday mornings at 8:30 and/or on Thursday evenings at 6:30 (as announced). Campus Ministry will continue by connecting with the Air Force ROTC students on Fridays in our building and with students at the Wesley Foundation on Wednesday evenings - along with our continuing hospitality to any students who join us for worship on Sunday mornings.

As you've heard me mention in sermons lately, we are a Mission Outpost for the Holy Spirit here at 1501 W. Chautauqua. Please continue to observe our neighborhood and community through the eyes of Christ, and pray for where God might be calling us to serve God's mission in creative new ways. As ideas come to mind, please share them with me or with members of the Church Council.

Blessings to you as the season begins to change and we experience the beauty of God's creation in a new way.

Social Ministry: 5 Projects To Consider

1. Bread For the World:

In October we will engage in a campaign to reduce world hunger. This effort takes two forms:

1) Writing letters to our legislators to encourage policies that alleviate hunger.

2) Monetary donations to Bread for the World to support lobbyists who advocate for our legislators to encourage policies that alleviate hunger. (Note: These contributions are NOT tax-deductible.)

Today the global hunger rate is one person in ten. Even more people suffer from malnutrition, leading to poor health and stunted child development.

Bread for the World encourages churches and community organizations to write letters to their Congressmen and Senators. They have the power to impact policies and programs that can end hunger. By taking part in the letter-writing campaign in support of the Farm Bill, you will help support federal programs like GusNIP and SNAP, and also funding for critical international food assistance programs.

Federal food assistance programs provide ten times as much assistance as all private charities and churches combined.

2. Annual Coat Give-Away:

My experience raising kids and grandchildren has taught me a valuable lesson: We feed them and they grow. If your kids also eat and subsequently grow, then last year's winter coats will be too small. Each year we collect coats and other clothing to give to kids who need them. We bring everything to University Baptist Church for distribution. Collection dates are from now to October 25. Monetary donations are also accepted.

3. Good Samaritan Food Pantry:

September was our month to supply the Food Pantry. The Food Pantry has been especially busy this year because of changes made to the SNAP program. This year there was a need for can openers in addition to good food. Good Samaritan goes grocery shopping with any monetary donations we provide to them. Thanks to all who supported this drive.

4. Spirit of Christmas:

LSSI in Marion is once again coordinating the Spirit of Christmas program to provide gifts to kids. We no longer go shopping for Christmas presents for the kids, as we did in past years. Instead, we collect monetary donations, and LSSI does the shopping. This works out better for all the congregations that are involved, and better for LSSI, and better for the recipients. We will collect donations for Spirit of Christmas through November 12.

5. Bell Choir:

Calling all kids who like to make noise. All kids are invited to take part in the bell choir program again this year. We will perform Christmas songs since Christmas time is fast approaching. Many thanks to **Jan Womack**, who purchased bells a few years ago and got the bell program started.



Lutheran Social Services of Illinois (LSSI) Is Coming to Epiphany!

Epiphany has been a supporter of LSSI since the agency came "south" with the emergence of the ELCA in 1988. Previously, its work had been limited to the northern reaches and upper half of Illinois, from its home base in Des Plaines. In 1990, LSSI was invited to consider opening offices and programs in Marion and Vienna. Early programs related to its Prisoner and Family Ministry sector, with a house in Vienna that served as a Greyhound Bus stop and a visitors' respite when arriving to visit family members incarcerated at one of the two Vienna prisons. Later, programs concerning Children and Family Community Services and Counseling programs opened through the Marion office and were located in Marion, Cairo, Vienna, and Harrisburg.

Usually in Illinois' ELCA congregations, LSSI is celebrated on Good Shepherd Sunday, which generally comes up in April/May. This past spring, Epiphany's calendar was full, and we did not have the opportunity to celebrate LSSI until now. This year, for us, Good Shepherd Sunday will be October 15! As a congregation, we welcome LSSI and its representatives, **Molly Arnoldt** (Senior Director of Development) and **Kevin Copeland** (Director of Prison and Family Ministries), to worship with us and to participate in our service and Fellowship hour two weeks from now.

It has been over a year since we last welcomed LSSI's leadership representatives to Epiphany, to share with us the joys of their work with children and families, incarcerated adults, and both children and adults with disabilities. Their LSSI Mission Statement calls its people to **bring healing, justice, and wholeness to people and**



communities through compassion in service to—and with—others. In southern Illinois, this is carried out through the Offices of Children's Community Services in Marion and Vienna, and Prison and Family Ministries in Marion. Our Easter Book-in-a-Basket and our summer School Supplies projects go to the Marion office headed by Lindsey Yordy, who will also be with us in two weeks. The Prison and Family office has, in the past, overseen, the Employment Skills School, which Marcia Anderson developed, and the Storybook project, with which several Epiphany members have participated.

Come, join us on October 15, to hear more from **Kevin Copeland** who will preach that morning, from **Molly Arnoldt** who will lead the children's sermon, and a discussion during the Fellowship time with Lindsey Yordy from the Marion LSSI office. Blue Good Shepherd Sunday offering envelopes will be available for contributions to either the statewide needs of LSSI or the more local needs of the southern Illinois office and its programs.


It is with much joy and thanksgiving that I announce that this past weekend the Synod Council of our Central/Southern Illinois Synod voted unanimously to call the Reverend Amy Ziettlow as our new full-time Assistant to the Bishop for Transformational Leadership. Primary responsibilities of this new role will include: Candidacy, Call Process, Interim Ministry, Synod Authorized Ministry, and First Call Theological Education. In addition, this new role will explore how we can think creatively and missionally about leadership in our congregations given the ever-changing context in which we find ourselves.

Pastor Ziettlow currently serves as Pastor at Holy Cross Lutheran Church in Decatur and as Dean of the East-Central Conference. In addition, she teaches dance in the Decatur community. She earned her Bachelor of Arts Degree from the University of Oklahoma in 1996 and her Master of Divinity Degree from the University of Chicago in 1999. Prior to moving to Decatur, Pastor Ziettlow worked for The Hospice of Baton Rouge, first as Director of Volunteer Services and Chaplain and later as Chief Operating Officer. Pastor Ziettlow's first call was as Assistant Pastor at Our Redeemer in Marion, Illinois.

Pastor Ziettlow is married to the Reverend Michael Karunas, senior minister at Central Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) in Decatur. They are the parents of three children.

Pastor Ziettlow's call to the synod will begin on November 1. We look forward to Pastor Ziettlow's faithful, creative, and joy-filled leadership among us!

News From the Global Missions Team — Willie and Anne Langdji

Here is a recently acquired letter from our missionary in West and Central Africa. Although Anne has returned to the United States, Willie remains, and it appears that the great work continues. Thank you for your support there, and also in the country of Madagascar. If you still need a Change for a Change jar, some are available in the narthex.

Good morning, Pastor Brian,

So sorry for this late response. I hope it will still be useful.

With Anne retiring back to the U.S. (so our son Micah can continue school), I will continue in the same role of Regional Representative for West and Central Africa. In this region, the ELCA accompanies national Lutheran churches as they seek to serve God's people through many different ministries.

In Senegal, the ELCA walks side-by-side with the Senegal Lutheran Church in the women's ministry, health, and education, providing support for skills-building programs that help young women who left school early to become computer literate, learn sew-



ing, embroidery, tie-dye skills to better their future and those of their families.

Also in Senegal, the ELCA provides support to the Senegal Lutheran Development services that run school programs, youth centers, and animal husbandry programs. The animal husbandry programs provide opportunities for Fulani herders to crossbreed their cows with foreign breeds like Holstein to have more milk which is a

source of protein for the family as well as an income

source for the women.

In the Central African Republic and Cameroon, I am working with the churches as they make final preparations for the centennial celebrations of the arrival of the first American Lutheran missionaries in Cameroon to start mission work that gave birth to the Lutheran Church of the Central African Republic and the Lutheran Church of Cameroon.



In the Central African Republic, the ELCA provides resources for education programs that serve children in 30 remote communities with no access to other such services and also supports young women to further their education after elementary school. The health program of the Lutheran Church of the Central African Republic runs Child and Mother-care health clinics as well as health centers in regions of the country where such services are very scarce or non-existent.

Both churches run seminaries and Bible training institutions for students seeking ordination at the end of their studies.

We are grateful to be your eyes and ears on the ground and to be living witnesses of your part in the transformation of lives in the way of Jesus.





Worship News: About the Worship Committee



The Worship Committee generally meets on the third Thursday of the month to discuss and plan for everything related to worship. The committee is presently made up of **Pastor Brian**, **Tim Fink (Chair), Lynn Smith, Betty Person, Deb Sarvela, Jane Terry, Laurel Fleming, and Jane Rose.** This committee further divides into the Hymn Selection Committee (**Betty, Jane, Pastor and Tim**) and the Altar Guild (**Laurel and Jane**). It recently came to my attention that the ELCA is encouraging churches to include in their constitution requirements for council membership representation from both the youth and young adult categories -- we would like to add similar representation. Tim Fink Worship Committee Like so many institutions, mainline churches across the country struggle with attendance and membership. A big part of evangelism (not all but part) is the worship service -- often the front door to someone choosing to become a member. So for the past year, our committee has been spending time at the beginning of each meeting discussing ideas from articles, books, and videos related to worship trends. I've put it on most agendas calling it "30 for Thinking."

The discussions often include questions like, "Why are people not coming to church?" "How are we different as a culture?" "What are successful churches doing?" "How do we balance tradition with modernization, especially being a denomination which is so rich with history and tradition?" Covid really put the hurt on churches (and most other institutions). But what came out of it is our new familiarity with Zoom and other live-streaming platforms. So, we are able to visit just about any church in America and see what they are doing. I've lost count of how many I've visited, but am struck by the wide variety found in the ELCA!

Finally, since the Church Council is working on revising our constitution, the Worship Committee description has been slightly updated to the following for your approval:

CR1.09. There shall be a Committee on **Worship**. It shall assist the Congregation Council in seeing that the services of God's house are conducted regularly and in accordance with the liturgy of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America and that hymnals and other devotional materials are provided and properly cared for. This committee shall supervise and strive to advance the welfare and effective service of the organist(s), the pianist(s), the choir(s), and other musicians of the congregation. Under the auspices of the Altar Guild, it shall arrange for the care of paraments, vestments, liturgical arts supplies and musical instruments. In consultation with the Rostered Minister/Pastor, the organist(s), the pianist(s), and the choir director(s), it shall furnish music supplies appropriate for use in the worship of a congregation of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. The Altar Guild shall be represented on this committee.

Next month I'll talk about hymn selection. Thanks for reading.
