Notes from the Pastor

The new calendar year is moving steadily along and with it the predictable flow of the liturgical cycle of the church year. We are in Year B (Gospel of Mark), and while I preached once per month on Sundays during Internship in Year B, preaching weekly provides many new discoveries along the way! This is especially true in the year of Mark because the brevity of Mark's text forces the lectionary to borrow almost equally as much text from the Gospel of John.

February wraps up the Time after Epiphany with the Transfiguration of Our Lord on the 11th. Three days later, Ash Wednesday kicks off the solemn and reflective season of Lent. **Please see more details at the bottom of this page and on page 3 concerning Ash Wednesday and Lenten evening services and meals.**

As we did with Advent and Christmas, the Evangelism Committee in cooperation with the Communications Committee and office staff, developed a colorful, oversized postcard which will be mailed to 2,500 households in 5 postal zones near Epiphany. The postcard lists all of our worship times and activities from Ash Wednesday through Holy Week and Easter Sunday. As before, we will have a batch of postcards available at church for you to share with neighbors and businesses. A corresponding outdoor banner will also advertise our Wednesdays in Lent.

Please take time to read the newsletter and familiarize yourself with the many opportunities to participate in the life of the congregation to enrich yourself and others. **February offers a way for your voice to be heard as part of the ELCA Commission for a Renewed Lutheran Church. See pages 16 and 17.** Reflective conversation about applying scripture to daily life, particularly within the Lutheran theological tradition, will begin with a new series of adult education classes from The Crossings Community (see page 15) on Sunday mornings at 8:30.

Having been a resident of Carbondale for two years, I received my first jury summons this month. My period of potential service is from Feb. 13 - 27. If I should be called to serve, we will make the necessary adjustments in the office to provide adequate ministry coverage in my absence.

Blessings to you as we begin to prepare our hearts and minds for the long season of Lent. I look forward to this shift in focus and sharing the journey with you as we await the joy of Easter.

A Note from Pastor Brian About Lent

The season of Lent will begin on Ash Wednesday on February 14th. **Before the service will be a meal prepared by the men of the church starting at 5:45 p.m. (coordinated by Tim Fink of the Worship Committee).** The purpose of the meal is not only for fellowship but also to raise funds for the two ELCA seminaries we support annually, the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago (LSTC) and the Wartburg Theological Seminary (WTS) in Dubuque, Iowa. Our goal is to raise \$1,000 for each seminary.

Light meals will also be served on the five Wednesday evenings of Lent at 6:00 p.m. Volunteers are needed to prepare the meals each week. Typically soup and bread are served, but any favorite dish that you would like to prepare and share would be welcome! Monetary donations may be made for the meals, which will contribute to our annual financial support of Good Samaritan Ministries. The Wednesday evening meals will be coordinated by **Peter Gimse** of the Social Ministry Committee.

You might even enjoy it!!!

Worship News

We're coming up to another busy liturgical season: Lent-Holy Week-Easter. So get your new 2024 calendars out! Lots of dates and times to write down.

Like Advent, we will have Wednesday evening suppers and service, beginning with Ash Wednesday, Feb 14. Yes, Valentine's Day! **And the men of the church are cooking dinner and doing the dishes**. Ladies, you are bringing your checkbooks. This isn't just to say "I love you," but it's a fundraiser sponsored by the Worship Committee which is charged with raising money for two of our seminaries. This is a free-will offering, but because it is Lent, we will use a little guilt to increase the contributions. Think of it as resurrecting indulgences!

Speaking of resurrection, this meal is resurrecting something done at Epiphany for years. It was originally a "Fat Tuesday" meal, but one day before the Ash Wednesday service. The old tradition, particularly in the southern United States, was to consume a lot of calories and fat before going into the sparse Lenten season. So, **Walt Rehwaldt** would rally the men and make pancakes! Because we're trying to raise funds, we're upping the game: this year the menu is roast ham with pineapple sauce, potatoes au gratin, vegetables (TBD because guys have trouble thinking about this), dessert, and drinks. For vegetarians, we will have macaroni and cheese. The schedule for this and the remaining season of Lent-Easter is as follows:

- Feb 14, "**Fat Tuesday**" **Ham Dinner**, 5:45: Dinner prepared, served and cleaned up by the men. Free will offering to raise money for seminaries. Women bring your checkbooks.
- Feb 14, Ash Wednesday Service, 7:00 PM: Full service with the distribution of ashes, but no communion.
- Feb 21, 28, Mar 6, 13, 20 (Wednesdays) Lenten Soup Supper and Service: 6:00 supper, 7:00 short, reflective service.
- Mar 28, Maundy Thursday Service, 7:00 PM: Service with Communion
- Mar 29, Good Friday Service, 7:00 PM
- Mar 31, **Easter Service**, 9:30 PM: Service with Communion followed by Lite Easter brunch and egg hunt to follow service.




Judge Christy Solverson: February Speaker For Learning In Retirement

She will discuss the new crime bill in Illinois which, among other things, eliminates cash bail. The presentation, held at Grace United Methodist Church, is free and open to the public. A social hour with light refreshments starts at 9:30 am, with the presentation following at 10:30 am.



Lenten Midweek Worship 2024

Ash Wednesday worship will be held on February 14th at 7:00 p.m. (following a meal at 5:45 p.m.). The service will use the ELW liturgy for the occasion and will feature the Imposition of Ashes (no Holy Communion).

For the next five Wednesday evenings (Feb. 21, 28; Mar. 6, 13, 20), worship will begin at 7:00 p.m. using the ELW Evening Prayer format (following a light meal at 6:00 p.m.).

Given the solemnity of the Lenten season, the services will be quiet with appropriate hymnody. The theme of the season will be "Lament", and there will be no homily or reflection to "interrupt" the flow. The intent is to provide a personal space for contemplation within the context of Christian community.

2023 Financial Results Update



Epiphany Lutheran Church is blessed with stable finances thanks to the generous gifts of many members and friends. This enables us to accomplish much ministry in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, which other congregations find hard to do.

Kevin Bame Treasurer At the end of 2023, several things made it possible for us to have money on hand that will give the church council and the congregation additional opportunities for various ministries. The total of these funds is \$44,812. They became available because of underspending in some budget areas in 2023, a significant individual donation specifically for grounds and land-

\$23,519 of the \$44,812 was transferred per the congregation's constitution to the Capital Improvement / Maintenance Fund. The balance was invested and will be held in reserves for emerging ministry opportunities and needs.

scaping, and investing in brokered CDs that delivered higher interest earnings.

Also of note, the Audit Committee completed their review of the 2023 financial statements and concluded that the financial statements were fairly presented, in all material respects. Now here is some more news from **Domoina**, who has returned to her home country and shared an email and some photos with **Pastor Brian**.



However, she contacted a Lutheran pastor (not sure what "brand" of Lutheran) in a rural area 4 km from her parents' home. The pastor and his wife walked with their child from their rural home

to Domoina's (Presbyterian) parents' home to visit with them – all because of Domoina meeting us and wanting to share greetings from one Lutheran congregation to another. Domoina's parents drove them back home and took the attached pictures. (On the next page)

"Since this isn't the actual geographic area or church we support in Madagascar, I don't want to confuse our folks. However, I think the personal touch of these pictures might resonate with people since they met Domoina. She says that the church pictured is typical of rural churches around Antananarivo."

Some Green Team Suggestions

Selected from United Methodist Creation Justice Tips:

"Jesus said the first of the Greatest Commandments (Luke 10:25-28) is to **love God.** How? We love the Creator by loving Creation, by caring for what God has blessed us with as stewards. Look at nature, all that surrounds us, as a gift to be cherished. **Give thanks and follow through with actions** that show your love of God.

"Jesus said the Second of the Greatest Commandments is to **love our neighbor**. He then told the story of the Good Samaritan, who cared for an injured traveler (Luke 10:25-37). Our neighbors near and far suffer from environmental injustice. Work to fix the "road"—the systems that perpetuate harm to those with few resources. **Join or support organizations that love** *your* **neighbor** by working for creation justice.

"Jesus said as part of the Greatest Commandment that we are to love our neighbor as we **love our**selves (Luke 10:25-28). We love ourselves by taking care of ourselves for the long haul. Live a <u>sustainable</u> <u>lifestyle</u>. Living sustainably makes the world better for ourselves and everyone else.

Jesus said we are to **love our enemies** (Matthew 5:43-45). He followed that statement with "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you" (Luke 6:27-37). Recognize the differences in tactics of hate versus strategies of accountability and reconciliation. **Speak up for change. Show a better way.**"

One example, from several:

"Love the earth. Stop using <u>Styrofoam</u>. This single-use "convenience" has its raw materials extracted from the earth, leaches harmful chemicals into hot food or drink, adds to the volume of methane from landfills, and exposes production workers to permanent nervous system damage. **Switch to reusable containers** for food and drink."

Epiphany is committed to using paper rather than Styrofoam and plastic in our fellowship activities. Might you do the same at home and places where you have influence?

It's February, But Are You Ready For Easter Baskets?

"BOOK IN A BASKET" PROJECT

With Lent just "around the corner" and Easter not much farther "down the road," the thoughts of some of us jump to our long-running Easter basket project for the children who are involved in LSSI's Children's Community Services, especially their Foster Care Services and Intact Family Services through the Marion office. For many years now, Epiphany, sometimes together with other congregations in our Southern Conference, has put together as many as a hundred Easter baskets which include a book, an Easter-themed bookmark, a small stuffed animal, a "toy" (often bubbles, crayons, or sidewalk chalk), and a reasonable amount of candy!

The books are designated for pre-school, primary, intermediate, middle school, and high school readers. **Mike and Carolyn Langan** have already written a Thrivent Action Team grant, which is generally used for the pricier books, but Walmart and other stores often have books on sale before Easter. Rural King used to have small stuffed bunnies, "dollar stores" often have the suggested toys, as well as candies. Baskets and the plastic wraps for the finished baskets can also be found reasonably in some grocery and dollar stores.

The Stewardship Committee will be collecting baskets and the items for the baskets from now until two weeks before Easter. In this early stage, one of the tables under the Fellowship Hall windows will be the gathering place! On the Sunday before Palm Sunday, we will have a congregation-wide Easter basket assembly during our Fellowship time after worship.

Please be on the lookout for baskets, books, and items to fill and secure these Easter baskets for the children in LSSI's programs.

Worship News: Technology



It was said more than once by the pundits on TV, "COVID won't change anything, it will just make everything go faster where it is already going." It certainly launched Epiphany's live-streaming of services. It wasn't even mentioned before COVID.

We've gone through quite a bit of technology with the church since I joined in the mid-1990s. At each addition there has been resistance, then adaptation and appreciation. I imagine that was the case when they went from candles to electric lights in the great cathedrals.

Tim Fink Worship Committee Chair The first technical addition I recall was the use of individual audio transmitters for the hearing impaired-- it worked on a radio frequency. We used that because many didn't want micro-phones or amplification in the church. Eventually, there was enough frustration with the transmitters that we went to PCC "floor" mics. At that time, some didn't want to see the mics or hear speakers, or for it to sound "amplified." They wanted to preserve the natural acoustic

sound of the church. So, white, flat mics were hidden on the altar and lectern, and the speakers were hidden behind a cloth screen within the altar. We struggled with making it loud enough to assist the hearing impaired, but not so much that others noticed the amplification. The congregation adapted to that, but eventually wanted more amplification with less feedback, and mobility for the pastor and lay assistant. So, we went to an inexpensive 4-channel analog system with wireless mics (first over the ear then lapel mics) and the speakers mounted on the walls—small, white domestic speakers because some didn't want to see or be aware of them. Then COVID hit, and this system wasn't enough because we needed more inputs and mics to fix the sound for the Zoom streaming. Today we have a 16-channel digital system with pre-sets and too many features to mention.

We've also gone through a few camera systems (and camera mics). The first was the in-house system that went to the nursery, which didn't last long. Then with streaming, we kept trying to improve the video quality and went through a couple of cameras. Presently we have a wonderful camera that moves remotely to multiple presets, has a 30X zooming strength, and excellent clarity and resolution.

Finally, when a member of the congregation offered to pay for a big screen, we added it. Some regretted to see this addition, but most have appreciated it.

So, thanks to COVID, we went in the same direction we were already going but faster. Not faster than other ELCA congregations in southern Illinois or nationally, but fast for us. At every addition, there has been resistance AND appreciation.

One more thing. All this equipment has now been moved to the back of the sanctuary, and a table is being built to accommodate it. But this equipment takes 3 operators: someone to run sound, someone to run Zoom, and another to run the slides for the screen. Along with the Lay Assistant, Greeters, Ushers, Acolyte, and pianist, there is a small army at work every Sunday. We need help! It is not difficult to learn, especially the slides. Please consider signing up.

Global Missions Support — 2023 Results

The Evangelism Committee and Global Missions subcommittee thank you for your generous support to Global Missions during 2023. As the result of several activities such as the Advent meals, we were able to send **\$1,200** to the ELCA to support our missionaries, **Willie and Anne Langdji**, as well as **\$1,067** to the Central/Southern Illinois Synod for ongoing relief to our Companion Synods in Madagascar.

Sunday Morning Adult Education – February / March



Dear Siblings in Christ in the Central/Southern Illinois Synod,

Dear Members and Friends of Epiphany Lutheran, My name is Kristin Largen, I am a member of the Commission for a Renewed Lutheran Church. This Commission was constituted in response to the action that took place at the 2022 ELCA Churchwide Assembly:

"...To direct the Church Council to establish a Commission for a Renewed Lutheran Church comprised of leaders of diverse representation from all three expressions that, working in consultation with the Conference of Bishops and the Church Council, shall reconsider the statements of purpose for each of the expressions of this church, the principles of its organizational structure, and all matters pertaining thereunto, being particularly attentive to our shared commitment to dismantle racism, and will present its findings and recommendations to the 2025 Churchwide Assembly in preparation for a possible reconstituting convention to be called under the rules for a special meeting of the Churchwide Assembly."
