Notes from the Pastor

Greetings in the name of our risen and ascended Lord, Jesus Christ! We begin May in the season of Easter and end with the festivals of Pentecost and Holy Trinity - all using the "Light of Christ" liturgy from *With One Voice*. You will have to wait until my June newsletter article to learn what's to come for worship this summer!

May is a month of transition for many people, particularly those who work in the field of education. **Campus Ministry** activities will be slowing down after a flurry of end-of-semester dorm collection and new student orientation events in preparation for next fall. **Affirmation of Baptism** on May 19th will mark the end of classes for our children and youth until next September, although the <u>Sunday morning adult study will continue to meet</u> by popular demand.

Ascension Day is always on Thursday, and on May 9th, we are invited to participate in an evening picnic and communion service at Ferne Clyffe State Park with Our Redeemer Lutheran Church. Details can be found on the next page of this newsletter.

Preparations are underway for the **Synod Assembly** in early June, with Festival Worship leadership being the responsibility of Epiphany. **Tim Fink and** I have been hard at work with other conference leaders to prepare for this significant event.

For the first time in Epiphany's history, we have a youth participating in the **National LYO Gathering! Olivia Terry, Anne Terry and I** are meeting to study the theme "Created to Be". Stay tuned to hear more about our preparations and calls for support.

I appreciate everyone who participated in the **Synod listening sessions** online and in person. Over 600 responses were received, which will go a long way towards helping **Bishop Greg** and his leadership team determine where to place their ministry emphasis in the short and long term.

Concerning feedback, I want to extend a sincere "thank you" to the 21 folks who provided comments to the **Mutual Ministry committee**, representing just under a third of our average Sunday worship attendance. I also thank the Church Council for collating and consolidating the responses into a meaningful written annual review. The information will continue to help me grow as a first-call pastor.

As I mentioned in last month's article, it's imperative that we have leaders serve on our Church Council. There are four vacancies that will need to be filled at our **Congregational Meeting on June 9**th. Please prayerfully consider serving. **Trish Welch** is the chair of the Nominating Committee and can answer your questions along with me.

Bread for the World is a Christian advocacy organization that works tirelessly to end hunger both in the United States and around the world. Their mission is to educate and equip people to advocate for policies and programs that can help eradicate hunger. Here are some key points about Bread for the World which is a program that we at Epiphany help support.

1. The Problem of Hunger:

- One in ten people worldwide goes to bed hungry every night.
- Shockingly, one in four children under the age of five suffers from severe malnutrition.
- However, Bread for the World firmly believes that hunger is solvable.

2. Collective Action:

- Bread for the World recognizes that churches, charities, food banks, and nonprofit organizations alone cannot solve hunger.
- Government programs and policies play a crucial role in addressing this issue.
- When enough people raise their voices, government leaders listen.

3. Impactful Advocacy:

- Bread for the World's legislative victories have positively impacted millions of people experiencing hunger.
- They have secured billions of dollars in humanitarian aid for countries like Ukraine, Ethiopia, and Palestine.
- Through nonpartisan political engagement, they've strengthened national nutrition programs.

3. How We Can Help:

- By supporting Bread for the World's advocacy efforts, you contribute to winning federal government assistance for families in the United States and globally.
- Every dollar you give helps secure hundreds of dollars in assistance.


4. Disproportionate Impact:

- Hunger affects every community, but Bread for the World recognizes that certain groups face a disproportionate impact.
- Women, communities of color, and rural communities are particularly affected.
- Bread for the World advocates for equitable and effective programs to end hunger in these communities.

5. The Symbolic Table:

- The organization's bowl and table logo symbolize their mission.
- They gather people at various tables to provide sustenance and advocate for nutritious food access.
- Bread for the World engages with lawmakers to enact policies that benefit everyone.







More News From the Green Team About "Bread For the World"

[Editors note: For many years Epiphany Lutheran has supported the **Bread For the World** organization which was started by a Lutheran pastor, **Rev. Art Simon**, who was the brother of the famous southern Illinois senator, **Paul Simon**. **Pastor Art Simon** died this past November and his work in establishing a program that has fed millions of people in the United States and around the world was recently honored. Here is an April news release.]

Earlier this month, Bread members and faithful supporters gathered for **Bread for the World's 21st Annual Gala to End Hunger: Partners in Progress.** Over \$600,000 in funds were raised and will be used to continue to support our efforts to address hunger and poverty here in the United States and around the world. **David Beckmann¹**, Bread for the World's President Emeritus, provided heartfelt remarks in tribute to Founder and 1st President, **Rev. Arthur (Art) Simon**, for the many years of service he dedicated to establishing Bread as a leader in the movement to end hunger and the legacy he left to carry it forward.

The evening also featured video remarks from **U.S. Representative Jahana Hayes (D-CT)** and **Senator Todd Young (R-IN)**, members of Congress who are also anti-hunger advocates, and supporters of many of the same programs and policies Bread cares about. Another key moment in the program was during the Impactful Partner Spotlight, when **Renee Albretch**, senior policy associate with World Wildlife Fund, spoke on the importance of key partners in the work of ending hunger. The premiere of <u>Life is Fragile</u>, José Soto Rivera's journey from experiencing food insecurity to becoming an advocate was also featured.

Rev. David Beckmann, also a Lutheran minister, has played a pivotal role in the fight against hunger and poverty. From 1991 to 2020, he served as the president of Bread for the World and Bread for the World Institute. During his tenure, he led large-scale and successful campaigns to strengthen U.S. political commitment in addressing hunger and poverty both domestically and globally 1. His efforts have been instrumental in advocating for the most vulnerable populations.

Beckmann's commitment extends beyond organizational leadership. He also founded and presided over the **Alliance to End Hunger**. As a **World Food Prize laureate**, he has consistently used his platform to raise awareness and drive change. <u>His book</u>, "**Exodus from Hunger**: **We are Called to Change the Politics of Hunger**", further underscores his dedication to this critical cause ¹.

With a background that includes a degree from the London School of Economics and 15 years of work at the World Bank, Rev. David Beckmann has left an indelible mark on the fight against hunger and poverty.

Have You Heard About the American Climate Corps?

This is for thousands of young people who might want a job protecting and improving our climate.

Interested? Read on

At an Earth Day event in Virginia just outside of Washington, D.C. this week, President Biden announced the official start of his new climate-focused jobs program.

"It's patterned after the Civilian Conservation Corps, the Peace Corps and AmeriCorps. Like them, it brings out the best in young people to do what's best for America," Biden said at the event. "We will put tens of thousands of young people to work at the forefront of our climate resilience and energy future, clean energy future. Today, I'm proud to announce that Americans across the country can now apply to become the first members of the American Climate Corps."

All kinds of skills and industries are needed to address the climate crisis, so the <u>jobs board</u> for the Corps lists everything from community outreach to biological surveys to invasive species removal.

Right now you can go on to **climatecorps.gov** and apply; we have about 2,000 positions listed with lots and lots more on the way. It's really exciting.

AmeriCorps is a key partner in the American Climate Corps. They are actually the lead agency; we are establishing an ACC hub at AmeriCorps. And, you know, there are a lot of benefits that come from being in an AmeriCorps position as well, one of which is a <u>Segal Education Award</u>, which means that if you complete your term of service, you can get a little over \$7,000 that can be used for student debt or for future education. So there are certainly a lot of benefits that come from AmericaCorps-specific positions.



Worship: The Link for the Zoom Service


