
You Have "Once Again Demonstrated Wonderful Generosity"

IN MEMORY OF: Paul A. Harre

Paul A. Harre, born February 25, 1944, peacefully transitioned from this life to the next on November 18, 2024 with his family by his side.

Paul grew up in Nashville, Illinois, with his parents and three siblings. He had a mischievous spirit, a twinkle in his eye, and loved to run wild and play pranks on his sisters.

His lifelong love of singing with diction, preferably in four-part harmony, was fostered by his high school music teacher and continued throughout his life.

Following high school, Paul enlisted in the Air Force, serving as a Missile Technician with the 306th Airborne Missile Maintenance Squadron. He was named Outstanding Airman of The Year at McCoy Air Force Base, Florida, a recognition he was especially proud of, as his parents and sister were able to attend the awards ceremony.

Paul later attended Southern Illinois University (SIU) in Carbondale where he completed his Associate's Degree, Bachelor's Degree, Master's Degree, and a Doctorate in Education. He spent his entire career at SIU within the College of Technical Careers, and the university always held a special place in his heart. Most days, he could be found wearing an SIU pin on his lapel or something in the shade of Saluki Maroon.

While his official roles were in teaching and administration, Paul's true passion was mentoring students. He found fulfillment in helping them navigate the challenges of schoolwork, career decisions, and the newness of being on their own.

Paul was exceptionally proud of the international work he did in collaboration with universities in Korea, Russia, and the West Bank. Delegations from each of the countries were always welcomed in the Harre home with food, love, learning, and laughter.

Paul married fellow Nashville High School graduate Catherine (née Ellerbusch) on December 28, 1968. They took their vows seriously and were married nearly 56 years, living in Carbondale, Illinois for most of that time. Together, they raised two beautiful daughters, Michele and Erin.


They lived on a peaceful piece of land on the outskirts of Carbondale with their horses, trees, and the quiet of nature.

A girl dad before "girl dad" was a thing, Paul found joy working on horsemanship with Michele, coaching many successful girls' softball teams with Carbondale Junior Sports, with high

school homecoming float building, and taking Erin to many softball and basketball games.



Paul and Cathy were founding members of The Lutheran Church of All Saints in Carbondale, Illinois, later known as Epiphany Lutheran Church. Paul helped build the original sanctuary, and the wristwatch that he lost in the process is most likely still embedded in a wall there somewhere. He later contributed many wood working projects that remain in the church, a lasting testament to his craftsmanship and memory. The community, love, acceptance, and support at All Saints/Epiphany became and remains a grounding and supportive presence for the Harre Family.

Later in his life, Paul was happiest when he could mentor, brag about his kids and grandkids, tinker in his wood shop, fish, and watch Saluki Softball games.

His skill at learning where any person was from within the first 2 minutes of meeting them and finding a shared connection to that place or person will remain unmatched. Also unmatched is the size and scope of what his family labeled "Harre's Useless Knowledge"- a vast repertoire of random facts that could be recalled at a moment's notice, though he could never remember where he left something just five minutes prior.

Both Paul and Cathy have had an unparalleled gift of creating a space that allowed those around them to love and care for them as if they were their own. The Harre family thanks the caregiving teams at The Landings in Carbondale, Cedarhurst of Highland, Illinois, and Bond County Home Health and Hospice for their love and care towards the end of Paul's life.

Paul is survived by his wife, Catherine Harre; daughters, Michele (Scott) Heinz and Erin (Ryan) Arnold; grandchildren, Emerson Arnold and William Heinz; sisters, Marlene (Douglas) Groll and Grace (Jack) Fincham, and many nieces and nephews. Given the opportunity, he would also include his "adopted" family- his daughters' friends, his students, team members, mentees, the staff at facilities where they lived, and the many friends he cherished along the way.

He was preceded in death by his parents Adolph "Mike" Harre and Hilda (Vogt) Harre and brother, Alan (Diane) Harre.

Visitation was held on Sunday, November 24, 2024 from 4:00 PM until 7:00 PM at Crain Pleasant Grove -Murdale Funeral Home in Murphysboro, Illinois.

Funeral Services were held on Monday, November 25, 2024 at Epiphany Lutheran Church at 10:00 AM with Pastor Brian Coffey officiating. Entombment followed at the Pleasant Grove Memorial Park Mausoleum. A luncheon followed at Epiphany Lutheran Church.

In lieu of flowers, the family requests with gratitude that memorial donations be made to Epiphany Lutheran Church and/or Bond County Hospice.



A Word To Advent From Bishop Greg Busboom



What word are we speaking into Advent this year?

The word that John the Baptist speaks into Advent is nothing less than the word of God, a word that comes to John in the wilderness.

The gospel-writer Luke intentionally locates the word that John is called to speak in the context of the political and religious structures of the day. "In the fifteenth year of the reign of Emperor Tiberius, when Pontius Pilate was governor of Judea, and Herod was ruler of Galilee, and his brother Philip ruler of the region of Ituraea and Trachonitis, and Lysanias ruler of Abilene, during the high priesthood of Annas and Caiaphas, the word of God came to John, son Zechariah" (3:1-2a). The word John is called to speak does not ignore the earthly realities whirling around him but rather is a word that speaks directly into them.

The specific word John speaks is a word from Scripture, the words of the prophet Isaiah from Isaiah 40. In stark contrast to the empty claims offered by the earthly and religious leaders of the day, the word John speaks is the word of salvation, not just for some, but for all — "and all flesh shall see the salvation of God" (Luke 3:6). While the promises offered by the earthly leaders benefitted only some, the salvation of God would be revealed to all. Not unlike today, this word was a radical word, a costly word, a word that would ultimately lead John to a platter and Jesus to a cross.

It can be tempting during the busyness of the Advent season to gloss lightly over the words of Advent. Avoid the temptation. The words of the lectionary readings, the words of the liturgy, and the words of the hymns all speak a word of stark contrast to the empty promises offered by both the secular celebrations of the season and so many of the political and societal structures in which we find ourselves. Read these words. Sing these words. Dwell in these words. And, for the love of God, preach these words, even when doing so is uncomfortable. They are words that lead us to Jesus, the only true Word, the Word that brings salvation not just for some, but for all.

His is no earthly kingdom;

it comes from heav'n above.

His rule is peace and freedom

and justice, truth, and love.

So let your praise be sounding

for kindness so abounding:

Hosanna to the Lord,

for he fulfills God's word! (ELW #246)

Southern Illinois University Commemorated Veterans Day on November 11


Southern Illinois University Carbondale commemorated Veterans Day with the annual vigil at the flagpole on the corner of South Normal Avenue and West Grand Avenue, near the center of the SIU campus.

This year's November 11 Veterans Day event marked the 43rd anniversary of the flagpole vigil, which began in 1981. The event honors SIU and Southern Illinois veterans who served their country in the U.S. armed forces.

Under the direction of **Paul Copeland**, coordinator of the SIU Veterans Services office, the SIU Air Force and Army ROTC programs provided this year's vigil, which began at 6 a.m. at the Old Main Flagpole, just south of Woody Hall. ROTC cadets stood silent vigil throughout the morning, changing shifts every 15 minutes, until noon.

At 11 a.m., members held a wreath-laying ceremony at the flagpole. The ceremony began with an invocation by **Pastor Brian Coffey** of Epiphany Lutheran Church, followed by a proclamation from Carbondale's **Mayor Carolin Harvey** and remarks by **Martin Parsons**, a veteran and SIU alumnus. The ceremony closed with the playing of taps by 19 members of the SIU Trumpet Studio, under the leadership of **Ricky Spears**, assistant professor of trumpet and assistant director of athletic bands.






This is the blessing that accompanies Thelma in *Night Visions*:

who bid us come and live.




Looking For a Poem and a Book Recommended For Advent

"Let's Give "Tatting" a Try!"

Recently **Trish Welch** and **Rachel Price** paid a visit to **Delores Brandt** "to try to learn how to do tatting." It's similar to crocheting, but with several differences. Keep reading if you want the "official" artificial intelligence definition located on the editor's computer.

"Tatting is a technique used to create a very strong lace using knots and loops. The lace is formed by using a series of cow hitch or half-hitch knots called double stitches to form a pattern of chains and rings. The tatter can leave gaps between the stitches to form openings called picots. Tatting is used to create lace edgings and doilies that are very similar to those in crochet. It is a way of making simple, durable lace, like you might find on collars, decorative edgings or doilies."
